Keysight M9037A PXIe Embedded Controller





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General

Do not use this product in any manner not specified by the manufacturer. The protective features of this product must not be impaired if it is used in a manner specified in the operation instructions.

Before Applying Power

Verify that all safety precautions are taken. Make all connections to the unit before applying power. Note the external markings described under "Safety Symbols".

Ground the Instrument

Keysight chassis' are provided with a grounding-type power plug. The instrument chassis and cover must be connected to an electrical ground to minimize shock hazard. The ground pin must be firmly connected to an electrical ground (safety ground) terminal at the power outlet. Any interruption of the protective (grounding) conductor or disconnection of the protective earth terminal will cause a potential shock hazard that could result in personal injury.

Do Not Operate in an Explosive Atmosphere

Do not operate the module/chassis in the presence of flammable gases or fumes.

Do Not Operate Near Flammable Liquids

Cleaning

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1 Introduction

Keysight's M9037A is a Windows PC that fits in slot 1 of a PXIe chassis. It is a 3U, 4-slot PXIe Embedded Controller providing:

- Intel Haswell CoreTM i7-4700EQ quad-core, 2.4 GHz processor
- 4 GB standard (or optional 8 or 16 GB) 1600 MHz DDR3 Memory*
- 240 GB SATA 2.5 inch solid state drive (SSD) front panel removable
- Integrated IO on the front panel includes two Gigabit Ethernet ports, four USB 2.0 ports[†], two USB 3.0 ports, GPIB connector, two DisplayPort video ports (also known as DisplayPort++), one PCIe x8 connector
- Front Panel SMB Trigger Connector used to route an external trigger signal (TTL level) to/from the PXI backplane with software trigger
- Preloaded with Keysight IO Libraries and Microsoft Windows operating system
- Pre-installed IVI drivers for the Keysight PXIe chassis

Related Documentation

A Windows OS and all M9037A drivers required to operate the controller and chassis were installed at the factory, no additional drivers are required. Complete M9037A documentation, as well as the PXIe Chassis Family documentation, is pre-installed on the M9037A SSD. It can be found from the Windows Start menu under Keysight. To use the full 16GB memory, a 64-bit OS must be used.




Figure 1 M9037A Embedded Controller Front Panel

Front Panel LED Indicators

The following table lists the LEDs on the front panel and a brief description of their use and what they indicate.

LED Indicator	Color	Description	
PWR	Green	If the LED is on, the power supply to the controller is good and the system should boot.	
SSD	Amber	When the Solid State Drive (SSD) is active, the LED will flash.	
LAN	N/A	These two LEDS are reserved for Keysight use only. The	
USR	N/A	EDs should never turn on or flash.	
PCle Link	Green	Indicates PCIe Link Status: Off = no link; blinking @ 1 Hz rate = Gen1 speed blinking @ 2 Hz = Gen2 speed LED on steady = Gen3 speed	





Both LEDs off indicate that the network link is not established or system is powered off.

LAN RST Switch

The LAN RST switch is reserved for Keysight use only. Depressing the LAN RST switch has no effect.

M9037A Functional Description




Figure 2 M9037A Embedded Controller Functional Block Diagram

CPU, Memory and Chipset

By introducing Intel quad core technology, the M9037A has four computing engines in a single processor, which can execute independent tasks at the same time in a multi-tasking environment. Combining this superior performance with a variety of instrument platforms makes the M9037A an ideal solution for your hybrid PXIe-based testing system.

The M9037A is also specifically designed to deliver excellent durability and reliability. A large aluminum heat sink dissipates heat generated by CPU and other critical components uniformly to maintain a stable operating temperature.

Processor

- Intel i7-4700EQ (Haswell) 2.4 GHz quad core
- DMI (Direct Media Interface) with 1 GB/s of bandwidth in each direction

Chipset

- Mobile Intel QM57 Express

Memory

- Two standard 204-pin DDR3 SODIMM sockets
- Supports +1.5V DDR3, 1600 MHz RAM per socket (up to 16 GB total)
- Supports non-ECC, unbuffered memory

NOTE

The M9037A was tested with the following RAM module configurations:

- one 4 GB RAM module
- one 8 GB RAM module
- two 8GB RAM modules (a total of 16 GB RAM)

Other configurations have not been tested.

CMOS Backup Battery

Keysight's M9037A is equipped with a 3.0 V "coin cell" lithium battery. This battery powers the clock circuit and retains configuration memory in CMOS RAM while the system is turned off.

I/O Interfaces

USB*

Keysight's M9037A provides four USB 2.0 Type A ports and two USB 3.0 Type A ports on the faceplate. All USB ports are compatible with high-speed, full-speed and low-speed USB devices. The M9037A controller supports multiple boot devices. The boot priority and boot device can be configured in BIOS. USB to VGA display adapters are also supported.

Differences between USB 2.0 and USB 3.0 USB 3.0 is the latest version of the Universal Serial Bus (USB). It provides better speed and more efficient power management than USB 2.0. USB 3.0 is backward compatible with USB 2.0 devices; however, data transfer speeds are limited to USB 2.0 levels when these devices inter-operate.

DisplayPort Video Connector

The DisplayPort (also known as DisplayPort++) video connectors connect the M9037A to standard video monitors. Multiple monitors are supported. The DisplayPort video ports provide a maximum resolution of 3840 x 2160 @ 60 Hz. Resolution for other video interfaces (such as VGA) depends on the adapter used. Typical maximum resolutions are:

DVI: 1920 x 1200 @ 60 Hz HDMI: 2560 x 1600 @ 60 Hz VGA: 1920 x 1200 @ 60 Hz

Ethernet

The M9037A has two RJ-45 connectors with link speed/activity LEDs on the faceplate.

GPIB Connector

The GPIB connector on M9037A is a D-sub 25-pin connector and is used to control external bench-top instruments. You need an optional GPIB adapter cable to connect instruments. The on-board GPIB controller has the following features:

- Compatible with the IEEE 488 standard
- On-board 2 KB FIFO for read/write operations
- Connect up to 14 instruments
- GPIB is a standard VISA Resource


NOTE

A GPIB cable is NOT supplied with the controller. Note that the GPIB cable is a standard micro type 2 GPIB cable with standard pin wiring and is not compatible with the M9036A Embedded Controller GPIB cable. It is available from Keysight as an accessory cable, part number Y1260A.

NOTE

You must have Keysight IO Libraries Suite version 16.3 Update 2 (or later) to use the GPIB.

PXI Trigger (TRIG)

The front panel PXI trigger connector is an SMB connector and is used to route an external trigger signal to or from the PXI backplane or from a software-generated trigger. The TRIG port connects directly to Trigger Bus Segment 1 on the PXI chassis backplane. Trigger signals are TTL compatible and edge sensitive. The M9037A provides the following trigger routing possibilities:

- From the front panel PXI trigger connector to any PXI backplane trigger bus line.
- From any PXI backplane trigger bus line to the front panel PXI trigger connector.
- From a software-generated trigger to any PXI backplane trigger bus line.
- From a software-generated trigger to the front panel SMB connector via any PXI backplane trigger bus line.

Trigger IO Functions All trigger modes are programmable through the factory-installed IVI trigger driver (M9037). You can learn more about the trigger functions by using the M9037A Soft Front Panel software available from the Window's **Start** menu, under Keysight, look for Embedded Controller SFP.

Refer to the Trigger Driver help files for information on using the trigger functions. The help files are available on "Windows Embedded Standard 7" by selecting the Windows **Start** button > **Keysight Instrument Drivers** folder > **IVI-COM-C Drivers** > **AgPxiPc PXIe Embedded Controller > AgPxiPci IVI Driver Help.** The help files are available on "Windows 10 Enterprise 2016 LTSB" by selecting the Windows **Start** button, **Keysight Instrument Drivers**, then **AgPxiPC IVI Driver Help**.

- The default trigger route (the path established at power on or at ResetRoute) has no internal connection to the front panel SMB connector and no connection to any of the PXI backplane trigger lines.
- If you read the current trigger routing (GetRoute) at power on or after executing a ResetRoute, it will return the string:

 AgPxiPcTriggerRouteNone.
- Trigger routes other than the four described above and in the following diagrams are invalid and result in an error. For example, you cannot route a trigger from one backplane trigger bus line to another backplane trigger bus line. Similarly, you cannot route a trigger sourced by the front panel SMB connector back to itself.



Front panel SMB trigger connector to selected backplane trigger bus











Trigger bus routing A formal PXI trigger bus specification does not yet exist. Consequently, trigger bus routing across PXI_TRIG segments may not work on all non-Keysight PXI chassis. Of course, the PXI_TRIG routing of all Keysight chassis works with any controller due to the open nature of the drivers. Keysight is working with PXISA to define a standard chassis trigger routing driver.

SATA Port

The M9037A provides a SATA 2.0 connector and is shipped with a pre-installed 2.5" 240GB SATA 2.5" solid state drive (SSD). The SSD may be replaced from the module's front panel without removing the module from the chassis.

Upgrading from the M9036A

If you already have a Keysight M9036A Embedded Controller and you are upgrading to an M9037A, be aware of the following:

- The GPIB connector and cables are not compatible.
- The video cables and adapters are not compatible.
- The IVI and LabVIEW API drivers and the Soft Front Panel software are not the same. You will need to update any programs/applications you have written and rebuild them. The IVI Driver syntax (for the Trigger driver) M9036A used AgM9036Trigger... (for example, AgM9036TriggerRouteTrigggerBusToExternal) but the M9037A
 - uses AgPxiPxTrigger.... Other than the prefix, the commands are identical.
- The M9037A Trigger Output has a mild pull-down (via a 100 K Ω resistor) to ~0 V. The M9036A Trigger output floats to ~3 V.

2 Using the Controller

Your M9037A comes with the Windows Operating System pre-installed along with Keysight's IO Libraries Suite. This chapter provides general system configuration and preventive maintenance procedures that you are responsible for. In general, the M9037A operates as any other PC.

Controller Startup

After inserting the M9037A controller into slot 1 of a PXIe chassis, press the chassis' power on button. After a few seconds, the controller will beep indicating it passed its Power On Self Test (POST). To boot into Windows from the splash screen, no action is needed. However, you have 2 other options. You can press the **DELETE**> key to enter the BIOS setup or press **F7>** for the boot device menu.

Using the Controller Controller Controller

Without pressing anything, you see the following Windows Boot Manager screen for 5 seconds. Either press the **Enter** key or simply wait and the Windows OS will start




Figure 4 Windows Boot Manager screen

NOTE

Microsoft Windows is the only general purpose operating system installed on your M9037A. The SSD includes a small system partition for the **Instrument Image Recovery System**. If you select the Keysight Recovery System, the Windows Boot Manager opens a menu with five selections.

Enter your selection and press the **OK** button. Follow the instructions on the screen.

NOTE

The M9037A will boot quickly and also shutdown quickly. For example, using "Windows 10 Enterprise 2016 LTSB" in an M9019A PXIe Chassis with no modules, the time from power-on to Windows 10 being active is 35 seconds. The shutdown time, from pressing the power off button on the chassis, is 5 seconds. If instrument modules are in the chassis or more chassis are added, these durations will increase slightly. However, some modules, such as a RAID controller, will increase the durations much more.

Chassis Power Inhibit Functionality

On some PXIe chassis, the controller may go into a state where the blue Status LED on the front panel is constantly lit but the controller never boots.

- For a Keysight 18-Slot PXIe chassis, this may happen when the rear panel Inhibited switch is set to "MAN." If the controller is stuck in this state, toggling (pulse low for a minimum of 500 ms) the Inhibit pin (pin 5) on the DB-9 connector causes the system to reboot. Alternately, change the Inhibit switch to the Default position and then power-on or reboot the chassis.
- For other chassis, refer to the manufacturer's chassis documentation.

M9018 PXIe Chassis PCIe Link Configuration

This discussion is applicable when using the M9037A in slot 1 of an M9018A or M9018B PXIe Chassis. It does not apply for use with the M9019A or M9010A PXIe chassis, because they have a fixed configuration of 1x8 and 1x16 for their PCIe Link fabric.

PCIe link configuration refers to how the PXIe chassis PCIe Switch Fabric is configured to connect PCI Express signals between slot 1, the system controller slot, and the other chassis slots. For a review of the supported PCIe link configurations, please refer to the PXIe Chassis Family User Guide (available from the Windows **Start** button, then look under Keysight).

For a detailed graphics, explaining the operation of the chassis PCIe data paths, see the *Keysight PXIe Chassis Interactive Block Diagram* at www.keysight.com/find/pxi-blockdiagram.

Keysight's M9037A embedded controller can boot and run with all of the PCIe switch fabric configurations supported by the M9018 chassis. The supported switch fabric configurations are:

- **1x8 Configuration** Referred to as 1x8, this configuration provides one x8 link from the M9037A embedded controller to the PCIe switch fabric. This link is routed by the PCIe switch fabric to all slots (2 through 18) of the M9018 chassis. While the 1x8 configuration will work with the M9037A, it is better suited for use with the M9021A system module which supports 8 PCIe lanes.
- **2x8 Configuration** Referred to as 2x8, this configuration provides two x8 links from the M9037A embedded controller to the PCIe switch fabric. Link 1 is routed by the PCIe switch fabric to slots 2 through 9, while Link 2 is routed to slots 10 through 18. The two x8 links provide the highest performance I/O to the 18 chassis slots; therefore, the 2x8 configuration is recommended for use with the M9037A.

- **4x4 Configuration** — Referred to as 4x4, this configuration provides four x4 links from the M9037A embedded controller to the PCIe switch fabric. Link 1 is routed by the PCIe switch fabric to slots 10 through 14, Link 2 is routed to slots 15 through 18, Link 3 is routed to slots 2 through 5, and Link 4 is routed to slots 6 through 9. While the 4x4 configuration will work with the M9037A, it is more advantageous with certain non-Keysight system modules.

Use the **PXIe Switch Fabric Configurator** utility to change the PCIe Switch Fabric of the M9018A or M9018B.

The **PXIe Switch Fabric Configurator** utility is available from the Windows **Start** button, then look under Keysight. Instructions for using the **PXIe Switch Fabric Configurator** utility are provided in the *PXIe Chassis Family User Guide*.

CAUTION

Once the chassis configuration process begins, it is very important that the process be allowed to run to completion. Any interruption of the configuration process will leave the chassis PCIe Switch Fabric in an indeterminate state, and will require multiple power cycles of the chassis and multiple reboots of the computer to restore operation (which will be to the 1x8 factory default PCIe Switch Fabric). To ensure that the chassis configuration process runs to completion, perform the following:

- 1 Windows power management Sleep and Hibernate modes must be left in the disabled state, so that your computer does not power down during the configuration process.
- **2** Do not turn your M9037A Controller off nor terminate the PXIe Switch Fabric Configurator utility while it is reconfiguring the switch fabric.

If the configuration process is interrupted, see section "Restoring operation after an interruption of the configuration process" in the PXIe Chassis Family User Guide for information on how to restore your system to an operating state. The PXIe Chassis Family User Guide is available from the Windows **Start** button, then look under Keysight.

Using Keysight Connection Expert

Keysight Connection Expert is a convenient GUI program for examining the state of the embedded controller, chassis, and modules. With the Connection Expert it is easy to see the equipment connected to the embedded controller and start Soft Front Panels (SFP).

To start Connection Expert double-click the IO control icon () in the lower right Windows Notification area. Alternatively, you can start it from the start menu. For "Windows 10 Enterprise LTSB" click on **Start** then **Keysight Connection Expert**. For "Windows Embedded Standard 7" from the Windows **Start** button, select **All Programs> Keysight Connection Expert**

3 The Connection Expert Chassis tab shows the content of each slot of the chassis. For example, the following figure shows a single chassis system with the M9037A in slot 1. With a single click you can start the chassis SFP or the embedded controller SFP.




Figure 5 Keysight Connection Expert - Chassis Tab

Using the Controller DisplayPort Video

DisplayPort Video

DisplayPort* is designed to be compatible with legacy display monitors. However, you may need a simple and inexpensive DisplayPort to DVI, HDMI, or VGA adapter. DisplayPort provides high resolution and long video cables. You must purchase an adapter for other video interfaces (such as VGA); maximum resolution depends on the adapter used.

A standard copper DisplayPort cable can support a video resolution of up to 3840 by 2160 over a length of 6.5 feet or 1080p resolution up to 50 feet.

Using Multiple Monitors example on Windows Embedded Standard 7

Keysight's M9037A controller supports dual monitor configurations through the two DisplayPort connectors. Once you've connected the two monitors, you may want to configure their arrangement.

Right-click on a blank area of the display (Desktop) then click on **Screen Resolution.** This opens the Screen Resolution dialog:




Figure 6 Setting up multiple monitors on Windows Embedded Standard 7

^{*} DisplayPort (also known as DisplayPort++) is a digital display interface developed by the Video Electronics Standards Association (VESA). The interface is primarily used to connect a video source to a display device such as a computer monitor, though it can also be used to carry audio.

DisplayPort Video Using the Controller

Click on the **Identify** button. One of the screens will be your "primary" monitor (numbered 1) and the other the secondary (numbered 2). Click on one of the two the monitor displays, the border around the display changes to a light blue. Check **Make this my main display** on the monitor you want to be your primary display—the main task bar and Start menu will appear here, as well as the initial run of most application windows. Both monitors should have **Extend desktop to this display** selected in the **Multiple displays** drop down menu.




Figure 7 Multiple monitors on Windows Embedded Standard 7

Audio

There is no audio hardware or drivers included in the M9037A controller. Other than the Power-On Self Test (POST) beeps, you will hear no sound from the controller. That means that there are no audible Windows alerts or sounds. If your applications needs audio, you can add USB connected speakers and microphone.

Using the Controller BIOS Settings

BIOS Settings

The BIOS setup program includes menus for configuring settings and enabling M9037A controller features. In general, you should leave the BIOS settings alone. If you are knowledgeable in BIOS settings you may want to set the following.

- BIOS Passwords
- PCIe Boot (Holdoff) Time
- Restoring Defaults (User Set or Factory Defaults)
- Automatic Power-on
- Monitor System Status

NOTE

Depending on your application, you may never need to update the BIOS on your M9037A. However, you should always upgrade to the latest Keysight BIOS. Any BIOS update for the M9037A will be available on the Keysight web site: www.keysight.com/find/M9037A.

The BIOS is custom designed specifically for the M9037A. Do not attempt to replace it with a generic BIOS.

You can look up your current BIOS version by booting to the BIOS screen or running the command "msinfo32.exe" from the run menu option.

CAUTION

Modifying BIOS settings may cause unexpected behavior in the M9037A. If this happens, follow the instructions under "Clear CMOS" on page 60 and then restore the factory default settings. Do not change a BIOS setting unless you are absolutely certain of what it does.

BIOS Passwords

There are two BIOS passwords that may be set using the BIOS Setup Utility: Administrator BIOS Password and User BIOS Password. These BIOS passwords impact the boot behavior of the M9037A and have nothing to do with the similar sounding login accounts of the Windows 10 and WES7 operating systems.

Administrator BIOS Password When set, you must enter this password to get into the BIOS Setup Utility. If you do not try to enter the BIOS Setup Utility (by hitting DEL at the Keysight splash screen), you will not be prompted for this password and the system will boot to Windows.

BIOS Settings Using the Controller

User BIOS Password When set you must enter this password to get to the Keysight splash screen. If you do not enter the password, the M9037A will not boot. If the User BIOS Password is set, then the Administrator BIOS Password is disabled.

Please see more information at "BIOS Password" on page 62.

PCIe Boot (Holdoff) Time

You should not need to change the PCIe Boot time. However, some PXIe instrument modules may take longer to be ready for enumeration than the PXI link ready requirement of 100ms. Consequently, it is possible for some controllers to enumerate the chassis before all of the individual modules are ready and therefore not enumerate them. If you have a situation where Keysight Connection Expert and/or the Windows Device Manager consistently do not find specific instrument modules when the chassis powers up, increase the wait time (valid range is 0 to 60 seconds). Configure this from the **Ad vanced** BIOS screen > **Holdoff Timer**.

PCIe Wake

The M9018B, M9019A, and M9010A PXIe chassis assert the PCIe WAKE signal on the PCIe cable when they power on. This signal propagates through the PCIe cable to the M9037A embedded controller through the front panel PCIe port. If the M9037A BIOS has PCIe Wake set to Enabled, turning on these chassis will also result in the M9037A embedded controller turning on. If this behavior is not desired, you must disable this BIOS setting.

The factory default is enabled.

Configure this from the **Advanced** BIOS screen > **PCle Wake**.

Restoring Defaults (User Set or Factory Defaults)

There are two types of stored default settings. They are

- **Factory Default Values:** The initial optimal setting that were shipped with the M9037A from the factory. Both the User Password and the Administrator Password are cleared.
- **User Default Values:** You can modify the BIOS settings and save them to memory and restore them when needed.

NOTE

Do not use the 64-bit BIOS settings with a 32-bit OS. Attempting to do so prevents the controller from completely booting. To recover, reboot the computer and enter the BIOS; reset all values to Default.

Using the Controller BIOS Settings

Automatic Power-on

By the default setting, the M9037A will turn on as soon as it senses that power is applied. This means that the chassis will power up as soon as you insert the controller into an chassis. Alternate BIOS settings are:

- Start the system only when the chassis power switch is pressed
- Power the system to its last power state prior to losing power.

This can be configured from the **Main** BIOS screen > **Power-up Mode**.

Monitor System Status

The BIOS monitors the following on the controller module:

- PCIe switch temperature
- CPU temperature
- Main PC board temperature
- Power supply voltages

These can be observed from the Main BIOS screen > System Management.

Windows Configuration Review

You must review the Windows OS configuration to ensure that it meets your needs and that you have the appropriate configuration for your security requirements.

Windows OS Versions

You can identify the version of Windows you are running by looking at the start button:



Figure 8 Start button ICONs indicate the version of Windows OS

Microsoft Windows OS is Activated

Keysight ensures that your copy of Microsoft Windows operating system is activated at the time it ships from the factory. However, the first time you install and turn on the M9037A and Windows starts, you must accept the End User License Agreement (EULA). A copy of the Windows EULA is in the M9037A at: C:/boot/SoftwareLicenseTerms.rtf.

If you want to verify Windows Activation, do the following:

- 1 In "Windows Embedded Standard 7", click on the Windows **Start** button. Click **Control Panel**, then **System**.
- **2** In "Windows 10 Enterprise 2016 LTSB", right-click Windows **Start** button, then click **System**.
- **3** Scroll down to the bottom of the screen. Under **Windows Activation**, you can view the activation status.

By looking at the **System** screen you can also tell if you are running a 32 bit or 64 bit version of "Windows Embedded Standard 7". M9037A Windows 10 is always 64 bit.

Windows Security

If your system is connected to the Internet, you should take the following steps to ensure the operating system is protected:

- Use an Internet fire wall
- Get the latest Windows updates
- Install and use up-to-date anti-virus software.

Open the Windows Firewall to look the status of, or make changes to, the firewall settings. On "Windows 10 Enterprise 2016 LTSB", right click **Start > Control Panel > System & Security > Windows Firewall**. On "Windows Embedded Standard 7", click **Start > Control Panel > Windows Firewall**.

Windows Update

The factory default setting for Windows Automatic Updates is to check for updates and notify the user if updates are available. It will not automatically install updates. This ensures that your M9037A is not modified, unless you accept an update.

In "Windows Embedded Standard 7", you can change the setting or manually update the Windows OS by accessing **Start > Control Panel > Windows update**.

In "Windows 10 Enterprise 2016 LTSB", you can change the setting or manually updating the OS by right-clicking **Start**, click **Settings**, and then click on **Update & Security**.

CAUTION

Windows Automatic Update is turned off by default. You may choose to turn Windows Automatic Update on after starting the operating system. However, Keysight cannot be held responsible for changes to the system caused by the automatic update process. Enabling automatic Windows updates exposes the controller to periodic OS changes and possible new system behaviors.

NOTE

Downloading and installing Windows Updates can be network and CPU intensive (impacting system performance) and some Windows Updates automatically reboot the controller. Therefore, Windows updates should be performed when the system is not in normal use.

NOTE

There is no 3rd party anti-virus software included with your controller. Anti-virus application software is the customer's responsibility. Having anti-virus software installed may have a slight impact on system performance.

CAUTION

Microsoft Windows update might happen without user acceptance. The factory image on your Embedded Controller has a default configuration set to notify you before downloading and installing any updates. However, Microsoft Windows will sometimes install updates without notifying the user, even if configured to not perform an update. If your application requires that Windows does not perform updates, please work with your IT department to determine the best solution. They may suggest isolating your network or setting up a firewall.

Microsoft Windows Update can sometimes be slow. There are many factors that can interfere with Windows Update speed. If you find that is to slow and you cannot wait, instead of waiting on Windows Update, you can perform an off-line install. Use the following procedure:

- 1 "check for updates" and note all the KB numbers that it is trying to download.
- **2** Browse to https://www.catalog.update.microsoft.com/Home.aspx and search for each KB by number.
- **3** In the search results select only the ones that match your installed OS. For example for Windows 10 x64 LTSB, you would select "x64 Win 10 LTSB".
- 4 Download each KB.
- 5 Install each KB.
- **6** Repeat this process until Windows Update says there are no more updates.

Auto Login

Your M9037A Windows default behavior is to automatically login to the Administrator account every time it boots. You do not need to type a password.

Default Administrator Password: Keysight4u!

The Keysight standard for the Administrator password is: **Keysight4u!** Your M9037A default Administrator account is most likely set with this password. If it is not set with this password, then there is no password.

Change Administrator Password

The default Administrator password is public knowledge. Keysight recommends that you change your password for improved security.

NOTE

Anyone who knows your current Administrator password can change the password. When you change your password you must enter the current password. Because Auto Login is enabled, you may not notice if someone changed the password.

How to change your password for "Windows 10 Enterprise 2016 LTSB":

- 1. Click the **Start** button at the bottom left of your screen.
- 2. Click **Settings** from the list to the left.
- 3. Select Accounts.
- 4. Select **Sign-in options** from the menu.
- 5. Click on **Change** under Change your account password.

How to set or change your password for "Windows Embedded Standard 7":

- 1. Press Ctrl+Alt+Delete, and then click Change a password.
- 2. Type your old password. Leave it blank if the password is not set.
- 3. Type your new password, and then type the new password again.
- 4. Press Enter.

Remote Desktop Connection

The standard Microsoft application "Remote Desktop Connection" allows you to remotely login to the M9037A across the LAN from another computer. It only works if the accounts have passwords.

If your Administrator password is set on your M9037A, then the Remote Desktop Connection is enabled by default.

NOTE

Anyone with network access to your M9037A can control your M9037A using the user name of local\Administrator and the publicly known default password of: **Keysight4u!**

For your environment, you must determine if this is a useful feature or a security problem. If it is a security problem, then change the password or disable Remote Desktop Connection.

Windows Time Service

The Windows Time Service synchronizes the embedded controller's date and time-of-day with a Network Time Protocol (NTP) server. Typically, the NTP server is on the Internet. You can enable or disable the Windows Time Service using the Services program.

- To start the Services program click Start, type "services", then click on Services.
- To look at the setting for the Windows Time Service, scroll down to Windows Time. Right click on Windows Time and select "Properties".
- If you want to Enable Windows Time Service and the Startup Type is set to Disabled, click on the drop-down menu and select Automatic. Click Start and then OK.
- If you want to Disable Windows Time Service and the Startup Type is not set to Disabled, click on the drop-down menu and select Disabled. Click Stop and then OK.

User Data Backup

All user data should be regularly backed up to an external memory device. This can be done across a network or to a USB device. Your IT department may already have a backup strategy which is suitable for the system and data. Also, user data back up must be done just prior to sending the controller back to Keysight for service.

The operating system supplied with your M9037A is licensed for use on the Solid State Drive (SSD) installed in the controller. If the SSD is replaced, you may be responsible to purchase or relicense the operating system.

System Backup and Recovery

After activating the Windows OS, you should create a complete System Image of your SSD as a backup in case you ever need to reinstall the operating system. There are several third-party backup solutions available. By definition, a system image is an exact copy of the computer hard drive. A system image includes the Windows operating system files as well as your system settings, application programs, and data files. You should regularly create a system image so that all data, applications, etc. have backups. The system image may be stored on a USB memory stick, multiple CD/DVDs, an external (USB) hard drive, or to a separate LAN drive.

When you restore your hard drive from a system image, it's a complete restoration—you cannot choose individual items to restore, and all of your current programs, system settings, and files are replaced with the contents of the system image. Therefore, you should also keep a regular backup of your data and applications.

You can also create Windows Restore Points to return your system files and settings without affecting data or application files.


Microsoft Windows is the only operating system installed on your M9037A. There is a small system partition for the Keysight Recovery System on the SSD. During the OS boot process, you are given the choice to boot normally or boot from the recovery partition.

NOTE

Some third-party backup utilities may destroy Keysight's Recovery System partition. If this happens, the Keysight Recovery System will not work.

Restoring Drive C to Factory Default System Image

During the boot process, you are given the choice to boot to the Windows operating system normally or boot from the recovery partition. If you select to boot from the recovery partition, you are prompted to review the Software End User License Agreement. Click **YES** to agree. If you click **NO** you can not proceed. The Windows Boot Manager opens a menu with five selections:



Enter your selection and press the **OK** button. Follow the instructions on the screen.

NOTE

Selection number 2 restores Keysight's original factory system image. The original factory image overwrites all content of Drive C. You must first backup your data and files.

Create a System Image

You should regularly create a system image of the SSD on the M9037A. The following procedure explains how to create an initial system image after activating Windows.

NOTE

If you purchase a replacement SSD drive (or hard disc drive) from a vendor other than Keysight, it must be the same size or larger than the original (240 GB) SSD in your M9037A. You cannot create a system image of one size of hard drive and then try to restore it to a smaller hard drive.

Always store your back up CDs/DVDs, hard drives, memory sticks, etc., in a secure place to prevent unauthorized access to your files

NOTE

Some third-party disk backup utilities may destroy the Keysight backup partition. If this happens, the Keysight Recovery System will not work. Follow the instructions provided on the following pages carefully.

To create a complete image backup of the SSD, perform the following steps before running your image backup solution:

- 1 Unhide the Keysight Recovery Partition. If you do not do this, it remains hidden and not included in the system image.
 - **a** Click the Windows Start button.
 - **b** Type **CMD** into the **Search programs and files** text box.
 - **c** Press **CTRL+SHIFT+ENTER**. This is the keyboard shortcut allowing elevation to "Run as Administrator."
 - **d** In the DOS Command window, type: **CD** and press **Enter**.
 - **e** In the DOS Command window, type: **CD Keysight\Scripts.** Press **Enter**.
 - f Type: HideUnhideRecoveryPartition.vbs unhide
 - g Press Enter
 - **h** The Keysight Recovery Partition is now unhidden and should appear in the Windows File Explorer.
 - i Close the DOS Command window.
- 2 Connect a USB hard drive to the M9037A. Make certain that Windows identifies and can run the external hard drive. If you are using a LAN drive, make certain the LAN cable is connected to the M9037A.

NOTE

The external drive must be formatted NTFS.

3 Run your system image backup solution.

- **4** When you have created the system backup, you can re-hide the Keysight Recovery Partition.
 - a Click the Windows Start button.
 - **b** Type **CMD** into the Search text box field.
 - **c** Press **CTRL+SHIFT+ENTER**. This is the keyboard shortcut to trigger elevation to "Run as Administrator."
 - **d** In the DOS Command window, type: **CD** and press **Enter**.
 - e In the DOS Command window, type: CD Keysight\Scripts. Press Enter.
 - f Type: HideUnhideRecoveryPartition.vbs hide
 - **g** Press Enter
 - **h** The Keysight Recovery Partition is now hidden and should not appear in the Windows File Explorer.
 - i Close the DOS Command window.
- **5** The system is now ready for use.

Restoring to a System Image that You Created Earlier

You can use the system image to restore the contents of your computer if your hard disk or entire computer stops working.

CAUTION

When you restore your computer from a system image, it is a complete restoration. You cannot choose individual items to restore. All of your programs, system settings, and files are replaced with those on the system image.

Be sure to follow the instructions in your third-party backup utility to restore the system image. Typically, you will use the most recent backup. Once the system image is restored, your system should function exactly like it was at the time you created the system image.

NOTE

IMPORTANT: You must regularly back-up your system image because if your SSD fails, there is no other way to get it back. This is required to completely restore your system on the replacement drive including any application files and data you saved on the drive.

The M9037A controller supports USB CD-ROM drives, USB flash disks, or a USB external hard drive as the first boot device. Refer to "Accessing the BIOS Setup Utility" on page 56 for information about setting the boot devices. These devices should be configured, installed, and tested with the supplied drivers before attempting to load a new operating system.

CAUTION

To minimize the risk of data loss, you should do the following:

- Create a system repair disk for WES7 or for Windows 10, create a recovery drive.
- Periodically create a complete system image. page 42.
- Back-up your important data daily to an external memory device.

Chassis and Controller Shutdown

As with any PC, Windows-based instruments should not be shut down by either turning off the power via an external power source or by pulling the power plug out from the chassis rear panel. This could corrupt the operating system. The approved way to shut down the controller is to execute the Windows shutdown process which shuts down the M9037A controller then turns off the PXIe chassis. Pressing the chassis power button will also shut down Windows safely and put the chassis into Standby mode.

However, pressing and holding in the chassis power button will do a forced shutdown, just like pulling the power plug.

Power Down Modes

Keysight's M9037A defaults to the Windows High Performance Power Plan. This plan does not allow the controller display to shut off or the controller to enter a sleep or hibernate mode. In the following discussion, the power modes or states are:

- S0-Power on and fully operational
- S1-Standby (sleep), CPU clock stopped, CPU/RAM powered on.
- S2—Low Power (sleep), CPU powered off, context cache lost.
- S3—Suspend to RAM (sleep), all context lost, system memory retained.
- S4—Suspend to Disk (hibernation), context data written to SSD.
- S5-Power Off (G2, Soft Off), requires reboot, LAN Port 2 is powered.

NOTE

You should not enable the Microsoft Windows sleep or hibernate modes, because you do not want the M9037A controller to go into sleep mode while it is running a user test program. Also, the controller may not have proper chassis enumeration when it wakes up from those modes.

If you have a USB keyboard with a Sleep button (sometimes this is a key with a moon logo), do not use it.

Do not use the Sleep or Hibernate modes from the Startup Button.

If you install the M9037A controller in a chassis other than a Keysight PXIe chassis, consult your chassis manual for power down behavior.

Wake on LAN

Wake on LAN* (WoL, also known as Remote Wake-Up) is an industry standard protocol for waking up computers that are in a low power mode (turned off but still has power applied) to be turned on by a network message. Keysight's M9037A supports WoL when the chassis and controller are powered down but AC power is still applied to the chassis.

Both LAN ports are powered from the auxiliary power supply in the chassis even if the power is turned off (as long as AC power is still connected to the chassis). The chassis INHIBIT switch must be in the DEFault position.

To configure the M9037A for WoL from power down:

- 1 From the Windows10 right click on the Start button, select Device Manager > Network Adapters. From the WES 7 click on Start, select Control Panel > Device Manager > Network Adapters.
- 2 Double click on the Intel(R) Ethernet Connection I217-V. This opens the Properties dialog box for the Port #1 NIC. Note that Intel(R) I210 Gigabit Network Connection is for the LAN Port #2 NIC.
- 3 Select the Power Management tab, then select both the Wake on Magic Packet from power off state and Wake on Link Settings check boxes.
- **4** Click **OK** to save and exit the settings and then close the Windows Device Manager.




Figure 9 Set the Wake on LAN feature

* The term "Wake on LAN" is a trademark of IBM Corporation.

Notes:

Wake on Magic Packet* from power off This mode wakes the M9037A from a power off state (S5) when it receives a Magic Packet*.

Wake on Link Settings If this is the only mode selected, it requires the controller to be in sleep or hibernate mode. This mode is not supported. However, when checked along with Wake on Magic Packet from power off, the M9037A will power on when plugging a LAN cable into the LAN 2 connector.

Wake on Pattern Match This mode is not supported.

PXIe Chassis and INHIBIT Switch

Keysight chassis have an INHIBIT switch on the rear panel. It controls whether the M9037A controller or the Inhibit signal on the rear panel DB-9 connector is allowed to turn the chassis power on/off. The default (DEF) switch setting allows the M9037A controller to control chassis power.

For more information, refer to the chassis User Guide.

Default Position

If the chassis INHIBIT switch is set to the DEFault position and the chassis is powered up, momentarily pressing the chassis front panel ON button causes a clean shut down of the M9037A followed by the chassis powering down. The next press of the chassis ON button initiates the standard power up process.

Pressing the chassis ON button for greater than 5 seconds forces shut down of Windows followed by the chassis powering down. The next press of the chassis ON button initiates the power up process where the chassis will be powered up and then the M9037A brings up Windows. However, Windows safe mode may be displayed in this situation because of the forced shut down of Windows.

Manual Position

Set the rear panel INHIBIT switch to the MANual position if you want to remotely control the chassis power using the Inhibit signal on the rear panel DB-9 connector. A high (or open circuit) on the Inhibit signal powers up the chassis while a low on the Inhibit signal powers down the chassis. Applying a low on the Inhibit signal powers down the M9037A simultaneously – that is, without shutting down Windows first. This may leave Windows in an unknown state. Therefore always shut down Windows prior to powering down the chassis using the Inhibit signal.

^{*} The Magic Packet is a broadcast (UDP) frame targeted to the controller. It contains 6 bytes of all 255 (FFFFFFFFFFF in hexadecimal) followed by sixteen instances of the controller's 48-bit MAC address, for a total of 102 bytes. Typical ports for sending WoL Magic Packets are UDP 7 and 9. There are a number of free network tools that can send WoL Magic Packets.

Things to not do

Using the Controller

To avoid leaving Windows in an unknown state, the front panel ON button can be used with the rear panel Inhibit signal. In this situation, however, the chassis power is no longer completely controlled remotely, and local interaction is required.

If the chassis and M9037A are powered up, momentarily pressing the ON button causes an orderly shutdown of the M9037A, but the chassis remains powered and the M9037A System Status LED HS (Blue) remains on. At this point, you have two options:

- Momentarily press the ON button again to turn on the M9037A and bring up Windows.
- Complete the power down process by grounding the Inhibit signal (pin 5 of the rear panel DB-9 connector).

If the chassis and M9037A are powered up, pressing the chassis ON button for greater than 5 seconds causes a forced shut down of Windows but, as before, the chassis will not be powered off. At this point, you have the same two options listed in the previous paragraph. However, Windows safe mode may be displayed because of the forced shut down of Windows.

Things to not do

As with any PC, there are several system-level settings and files that you should not change, move, or delete as this could cause a number of difficulties.

Windows Registry

Do not manually make any changes to the registry unless you know exactly what you are doing. Making changes to the registry could affect the controller's ability to boot-up, execute programs, and display desired information.

Application Software

Do not remove files under the **C:\Program Files** folder by any means other than using the Add or Remove Programs utility found on the Control Panel. Do not remove any software application that was preinstalled by Keysight, even using the Add or Remove Program Utility, unless you are instructed by Keysight to do so while performing an update.

SSD Drive

Do not repartition the Solid State Drive (SSD) drive or rename any of the existing partitions. Doing so could cause the controller to either not have the disk space required or not be able to find needed data.

Software Application Licenses

Some software applications require a license to use to the software. For security reasons the licensing mechanism often uses a composite HostID which depends on several system identifiers. A change to any identifier may result in invalidating the licenses on that system. In general, you can retrieve "lost" Keysight software licenses at any time on the Keysight Software Licensing system (ASL) web site at www.keysight.com/find/softwarelicense. You will need the license order number and certificate number as well as a valid login and password.

If either of the following occurs, verify and possibly reissue the license.

- The SSD is re-imaged, replaced, or corrupted.
- The controller motherboard is replaced or the primary (system) BIOS serial number has changed.

For more information, refer to the software application documentation.

Using Multiple SSD in a single M9037A

The SSD is mounted on a carrier that can easily be inserted or removed from the M9037A (see "Replacing the SSD" on page 69). For some working environments, it is very convenient to use multiple SSD so that you can make changes to one SSD without disturbing the other. This is convenient when multiple people are using the same M9037A and they do not want to interfere with the other person's project. It is also convenient when one person is supporting the M9037A as deployed to the factory floor, while developing new code for later deployment. From Keysight, you can purchase additional SSD with carrier and with a windows operating system (see "M9037A Accessories" on page 23). Alternatively, you can buy a new SSD from a 3rd party, copy your old SSD to the new SSD, install it in your carrier, and insert it into your M9037A.

Drivers

All of the M9037A Controller and chassis drivers were installed on your controller at the factory. You should not need to reinstall them. However, you should periodically check the M9037A web page (www.keysight.com/find/M9037A) for updated drivers.

For the IVI driver, help file, program examples, etc. go to the following SSD folder:

C:\Program Files\IVI Foundation\IVI\Drivers\AgPxiPc

Controlling Multiple Chassis with the M9037A

Keysight's M9037A controller can manage the instruments in multiple PXIe or AXIe chassis. The Keysight Multi-Chassis Designer www.keysight.com/find/pxie-multichassis) is an interactive tool to help you design multi-chassis systems. The following is a summary of information presented by Designer.





Figure 10 Dual Chassis Configuration with the M9037A Controller

Figure 10 shows a basic multiple-chassis configuration. The required components for this basic configuration include:

- One Master PXIe chassis
- One subordinate chassis -- either a PXIe chassis (such as the M9010A, M9018B, or M9019 chassis) or an AXIe chassis (such as the Keysight M9502A or M9505A AXIe chassis).
- Only Microsoft Windows 64-bit Operating Systems is supported (32-bit OS for multiple chassis is not supported).
- One M902xA PCI Cable Interface is required in a subordinate PXIe chassis.
- One Y1200B PCIe cable.

Multiple Chassis Configurations

- To support multiple chassis (up to four chassis are supported), the following restrictions apply:
- Connecting more than one subordinate chassis -- via M902xA Cable Interface modules installed in the Master or subordinate chassis -- is not supported.
- Use the latest version of Keysight IO Libraries Suite.
- You must turn on the subordinate chassis and wait for the chassis status light to turn solid green before turning on the Master chassis with the M9037A controller.
- The M9037A should have the latest BIOS version. See ""BIOS Main Setup Menu" on page 57 to determine the current BIOS version in your M9037A and guidelines to update the BIOS if necessary.
- Only a 64-bit OS is supported. 8 GB (or more) of memory should be installed in the M9037A.

You must turn on the subordinate chassis before turning on the master chassis with the M9037A controller.

When you run Keysight's Connection Expert, both chassis appear in the main panel along with the PXI modules in each chassis.

NOTE

In the PXIe chassis, the M9021A Cable Interface module does not derive power from the chassis connector used by PXI embedded controllers. Instead, the M9021A uses the top connector on the chassis backplane for its 3.3V and 12V power. However, a switch on the M9018 chassis backplane must be set to supply those voltages to the connector. The default position of the switch is to the left and does not supply the voltages to the connector. To use the M9021A in the M9018 chassis, you must move the slide switch to the right before installing the module. Refer to the M9018 chassis documentation for more information.



3 Controller Maintenance

This chapter covers information for users to maintain the controller.

BIOS Setup

The Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) is a program that provides a basic level of communication between the processor and peripherals. In addition, the BIOS also contains code for various advanced features applied to the M9037A controller. The BIOS setup program includes menus for configuring settings and enabling M9037A controller features.

NOTE

Depending on your application, you may never need to update the BIOS on your M9037A. However, you should always upgrade to the latest Keysight BIOS. Any BIOS update for the M9037A will be available on the Keysight web site:

www.keysight.com/find/M9037A.

The BIOS is custom designed specifically for the M9037A. Do not attempt to replace it with a generic BIOS.

CAUTION

Changing BIOS settings may lead to incorrect controller behavior and possibly an unbootable controller. If this happens, follow the instructions under "Clear CMOS" on page 60 and then restore the default settings. Do not change a BIOS setting unless you are absolutely certain of what it does.



Controller Maintenance BIOS Setup

Normal BIOS Operation and Updates

The M9037A has two BIOS images, a Default and a Backup. The Default BIOS is what the system normally boots on, and is updatable by running a BIOS update script from a Windows console. Refer to "Updating the M9037A BIOS" on page 66.

However, if the Default BIOS becomes corrupt, the Baseboard Management Controller (BMC) detects that the Default BIOS was unable to boot, and re-configures serial connections to allow the Backup BIOS to boot the system. All subsequent boots will be from the Backup BIOS until the user repairs the Default BIOS using a provided tool from Keysight to restore the Default BIOS image to the original shipping BIOS image.

- Typically, all normal boots occur from the Default BIOS; the Backup BIOS is not used.
- Updates to the Default BIOS are done using BIOS update scripts from Keysight which are based on American Megatrends (AMI) tools.
- A BIOS update does not overwrite permanent SMBios data values (such as SerialNumber, BaseBoardVersion, UUID etc), but will clear the customer CMOS settings.

Accessing the BIOS Setup Utility

To start the BIOS setup program:

- **1** Power on or reboot your M9037A controller.
- 2 Press the < Delete > key when the controller beeps. This should be concurrent with the main startup screen. The BIOS setup program loads after a short delay.

The Main BIOS setup menu (see next page) is displayed when you first enter the BIOS setup program.

Use the following keys to navigate through the BIOS setup program:

- \leftarrow , \rightarrow Use the left/right arrow keys to move between the setup menus.
- \uparrow , \downarrow Use the up/down arrow keys to move between options in a menu.
- <Enter> Use this key to enter a submenu or display all available settings for a highlighted configuration option.
- <Esc> Use this key to return to the previous menu. This key serves as a shortcut to the Exit menu when user is at the top-level menus.
- <+> and <-> Use these keys to cycle between available settings.
- <Tab> Use this key to select time and date fields.
- <F1> This key opens the general help window for the BIOS.
- <F2> This key loads previous values into the BIOS.
- <F3> This key restores default values into the BIOS.

BIOS Setup Controller Maintenance

- <F4> This key saves the current configuration and exits the BIOS setup.
- <F9> Use this key to load the optimal default BIOS settings.

BIOS Main Setup Menu

The Main setup menu reports some basic information of controller:




Figure 11 Main BIOS Setup Menu

- BIOS Information This item includes the BIOS version and the date when the BIOS was built.
- Memory Information This item shows the M9037A's memory size, type and speed detected by the BIOS.
- ME Information This value indicates the version of management engine.
- Board Information Such as hardware revisions and serial number.
- From this screen you can set the system date and time.

Default Settings

There are two types of stored default settings in the BIOS. They are:

- Factory Default Values: The initial optimal settings that were shipped with the M9037A. Both the User BIOS Password and the Administrator BIOS Password are cleared.
- User Default Values: The default settings that are saved by using the BIOS Setup Utility. After making changes, tab over to the Save & Exit tab, select the Save as User Defaults field.

Controller Maintenance BIOS Setup

Restoring Defaults

Default settings can be recovered by any of the following three processes:

- Execute a Clear CMOS (see "Clear CMOS" on page 60). This clears more data than **Restore Defaults** alone.

- Entering the BIOS Setup Utility then navigate to the **Save & Exit** tab, select **Restore Defaults**.
- Entering the BIOS Setup Utility then navigate to the **Save & Exit** tab then restore user defaults by selecting the **Restore User Defaults** field.

The first two processes result in the same factory default settings being restored. The Clear CMOS is used when the System or the Setup Utility cannot be entered because either the Administrator BIOS Password and/or the User BIOS Password is set and unknown. If the Setup Utility can be entered then use the Restore Default field to set all fields back to their default values and clear both BIOS passwords.

Restore Using Clear CMOS To clear the CMOS RAM, i.e., change the BIOS settings back to the Factory Default Setting, the chassis must be powered down and the M9037A must be removed. See "Clear CMOS" on page 60.

Restore Using the Setup Utility To restore the Factory BIOS settings then use the Setup Utility navigate to Save & Exit tab Restore Defaults field and press enter then do a save. The BIOS passwords will be cleared, the BIOS settings will return to their factory values. The User Default Values will NOT be cleared including any BIOS passwords stored with these values.

Difference between ClearCMOS and Restore Defaults

Both of these methods set the BIOS values to their factory settings. This includes clearing both the Administrator BIOS Password and the User BIOS Password. The ClearCMOS should be used when one or both Administrator and User BIOS Passwords are unknown, or when Restore Defaults does not work. If the ClearCMOS is used then the clock must manually be set to the correct date/time.

Restore the User Default Values

To restore the User Default Values use the BIOS Setup Utility then navigate to **Save & Exit** tab, select the **Restore User Defaults** field, press **Enter** then do a save. The BIOS passwords will be the values that were stored, the BIOS settings will set to their User Default values.

BIOS Setup Controller Maintenance

Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)

Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage or destroy electronic components. All work on electronic assemblies should be performed at a static-safe work station. The following figure shows an example of a static-safe work station using two types of ESD protection. Purchase acceptable ESD accessories from your local supplier.

- Conductive table-mat and wrist-strap combination.
- Conductive floor-mat and heel-strap combination.

Both types, when used together, provide a significant level of ESD protection. Of the two, only the table-mat and wrist-strap combination provides adequate ESD protection when used alone. To ensure user safety, the static-safe accessories must provide at least 1 $\text{M}\Omega$ of isolation from ground.



Inspect for damage

After unpacking the embedded controller, carefully inspect it for any shipping damage. Report any damage to the shipping agent immediately, as such damage is not covered by the warranty.



To avoid damage when handling a module; do not touch exposed connector pins.

Controller Maintenance BIOS Setup

Clear CMOS

If you encounter an abnormal condition that causes M9037A to halt or fail to boot, clear the CMOS and restore the controller BIOS to its factory default settings.

CAUTION

Always observe ESD precautions. See "Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)" on page 59.

To clear the CMOS:

- 1 Shut down the controller operating system. Do not unplug the chassis from the AC power.
- **2** Remove the M9037A Embedded Controller from the chassis. Observe all anti-static precautions.




Figure 12 M9037A Switches

- **3** Locate the Clear CMOS switch on the board. It is near the CMOS backup battery. Move the switch from Normal to Clear. Refer to Figure 12 below.
- **4** Wait at least 30 seconds then return the switch to its Normal position.
- **5** Reinstall the controller back into the PXIe chassis.
- **6** Power on the chassis.
- **7** Press the **Delete** key when the controller beeps. This should be concurrent with the main startup screen. The BIOS setup program loads after a short delay.
- **8** Load Optimized defaults in the BIOS setup.
 - **j** The Main setup menu reports some basic information of controller. Refer to "BIOS Settings" on page 34 for more information.
 - **k** Use the down arrow key (\downarrow) to select the System Date and System Time.
 - **l** Set these to the correct current date and time.
 - **m** Press the <F4 > key to save the settings and then the <ESC > key to exit the BIOS setup.

NOTE

System date and time should be set before pressing F4. F4 saves and then exits the BIOS setup utility. If the BIOS data is not saved before exiting the utility, then the last BIOS settings remain.

Controller Maintenance BIOS Setup

BIOS Password




Figure 13 BIOS Password Flowchart

There are two BIOS passwords that may be set using the BIOS Setup Utility: Administrator BIOS Password and User BIOS Password. Figure 13, "BIOS Password Flowchart," on page 63 shows what happens with BIOS passwords when the controller powers-up.

Note that these BIOS passwords have nothing to do with the Windows Operating System passwords. Although their names are similar to Windows login accounts, they have no impact once the Windows Operating System is booting.

Administrator BIOS Password

At power-on, if the Administrator BIOS Password is set then before the BIOS Setup Utility can be entered, a message box appears asking for the Administrator BIOS Password. After you enter the Administrator BIOS Password, the controller continues into the BIOS Setup Utility.

User BIOS Password

At power-on, if the User BIOS Password is set, then before the black splash screen is displayed, a message box will appear asking for the User BIOS Password. After you enter the User BIOS Password, the controller continues to the black Splash Screen. At that time if the [Delete] is pressed the Setup Utility will be entered. Notice the Administrator BIOS Password was NOT needed even if it is set.

Creating a BIOS Password

The Administrator and User BIOS passwords can be set or cleared by:

- 1 Pressing the **Delete** key during power-up. This should be concurrent with the main startup screen. The BIOS setup program loads after a short delay.
- **2** Then navigate to the **Security** tab in the BIOS Setup Utility and select (highlighting) the password to be changed.
- If the BIOS password is <u>not</u> already set, a message box appears asking for a BIOS password to be created, then another message box will ask for it to be entered again to confirm the BIOS password.
- If the BIOS password was already set, then a message box will appear asking for the password to be entered followed by a message box asking for the new password.
- If a new BIOS password is not entered (left blank) then a box will appear asking if the password should be cleared. Any changes to any passwords will be discarded unless a save (**Save & Exit** tab) is executed. The Administrator BIOS Password will be active on the next restart of the M9037A. The User BIOS Password will be requested when the Setup Utility is exited.

Controller Maintenance BIOS Setup

PCIe Boot (Holdoff) Time

You should not need to change the PCIe Boot time. However, some PXIe instrument modules may take longer to be ready for enumeration than the PXI link ready requirement of 100ms. Consequently, it is possible for some controllers (such as the Keysight M9037A Embedded Controller) to enumerate the chassis before all of the individual modules are ready and therefore not enumerate them. If you have a situation where Keysight Connection Expert and/or the Windows Device Manager consistently do not find specific instrument modules when the chassis powers up, increase the wait time (valid range is 0 to 60 seconds).

This can be configured from the **Advanced** BIOS screen **> ACPI and Power Management field > Power-up Mode**.

PCIe Performance

If your application performs intensive IO over PCIe, you should Enable **PCIe Performance**. This has the effect of disabling the CPU Processor Power
Mangement (PPM) features of EIST and Turbo Mode. Tests have shown that PPM
features must be disabled to support long running PCIe data transfers without
momentary interruptions.

PCIe Performance is enabled by default. It can be enabled/disabled from the **Advanced** BIOS screen > **PCIe Performance.**

Both EIST and Turbo Mode can be independently enabled/disabled from the **Advanced** BIOS screen > **CPU**. However, their configuration options are only visible when **PCle Performance** is set to disabled.

Above 4G Decoding

If you have connected multiple chassis to your embedded controller, then you should enable **Above 4G Decoding**. When the embedded controller is enumerating many PCIe devices, more memory mapped IO space is required for these devices. Enabling **Above 4G Decoding** allows 64 bit PCIe devices to use addresses in the 64 bit address space. Failure to enable **Above 4G Decoding** when it is needed will result in failure to enumerate some PCIe devices and/or chassis.

This setting only applies to 64 bit OS. Do not turn it on if you are running a 32 bit OS. Some earlier releases of the embedded controller disk images use 32 bit WinPE to perform recovery operations. For those releases, if you want to use the recovery partition (selected at boot time from the boot menu), you must first disable **Above 4G Decoding**.

Above 4G Decoding is disabled by default. It can be configured from the **Advanced** BIOS screen > **PCI** and **PCIe**.

BIOS Setup Controller Maintenance

Automatic Power-on

By default setting, the M9037A turns on as soon as it senses that power is applied. This means that the chassis will power up as soon as you insert the controller into a PXIe chassis. Alternate BIOS settings are:

- Start the system only when the chassis power switch is pressed
- Power the system to its last power state prior to losing power.

This can be configured from the **Main** BIOS screen > **Power-up Mode**.

Monitor System Status

The BIOS monitors the following on the controller module:

- PCIe switch temperature
- CPU temperature
- Main PC board temperature
- Power supply voltages

These can be observed from the **Main** BIOS screen > **System Management**.

System Date and Time

You can set the system date and time in the BIOS Main screen or in the Windows Operating System.

Updating the M9037A BIOS

Depending on your application, you may never need to update the BIOS on your M9037A. However, you should always upgrade to the latest Keysight BIOS. Keysight's AGxx BIOS' are custom designed specifically for the M9037A. Do not attempt to replace it with a generic BIOS.

Any BIOS update for the M9037A will be available on the Keysight web site: www.keysight.com/find/M9037A. Click on Visit Technical Support, then the Drivers, Firmware, and Software tab. Scroll down and click on the M9037A BIOS link. Under Supporting Documentation is an instruction sheet for updating the BIOS. The Keysight BIOS upgrade utility allows you to restore or upgrade the BIOS in your M9037A PXIe Embedded Controller.

Replacing the CMOS Battery

The M9037A is provided with a 3.0 V "coin cell" lithium battery. This battery backs up the Real Time Clock. To replace the battery, proceed as follows:

CAUTION

Always observe ESD precautions. See "Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)" on page 59.

- 1 Turn off the PXIe Chassis.
- **2** Remove the M9037A Embedded Controller from the chassis. Observe all anti-static precautions.
- **3** Locate and remove the battery (see Figure 14 below). Press the battery release latch (1). The battery should pop out (2).



Figure 14 Replacing the Battery

4 Place the new battery in the socket. Make sure that you correctly orient the battery for installation. The positive pole (+) <u>must</u> be on the top. You may find it helpful to angle the battery in and pull back on the battery release latch.

NOTE

Replace the lithium battery with an identical battery (CR2032 or equivalent).

5 Install the embedded controller back in the PXIe chassis and apply power.

NOTE

The battery's operational temperature range is less than that of the M9037A's storage temperature range. For exact range information, refer to the battery manufacturer's specifications.

NOTE

Ensure that the battery is correctly replaced. Replace the battery only with an identical type (CR2032 or equivalent). Dispose of used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions. Typical battery life varies considerably and depends on operating temperature and standby (shutdown) time of the system. Typical life expectancy of a 225mAh battery is 4 to 5 years with an average on-time of 8 hours per working day at an operating temperature of 30°C. To ensure that the lifetime of the battery has not been exceeded, you should change the battery after 3 to 4 years of service.

Replacing the SSD Controller Maintenance

Replacing the SSD

The Keysight M9037A Embedded controller comes with a 240 GB, 2.5" Serial ATA (SATA) II Solid State Drive (SSD).

Replacement SSD drives are available with installed operating system as:

- Y1264A -- spare SSD with carrier, Windows 7 Embedded, 32 bit, 240 GB.¹
- Y1265A -- spare SSD with carrier, Windows 7 Embedded, 64 bit, 240 GB.¹
- Y1265B -- spare SSD with carrier, Windows 10, 64 bit, 240 GB.¹

To remove the SSD with carrier from the M9037A, perform the following steps:

- 1 Power off the PXIe chassis. You do not need to remove the M9037A controller from the chassis to replace the SSD drive.
- **2** Loosen the two thumb screws securing the SSD cover to the controller's front panel.
- **3** Grab the handle and pull straight out.

To insert the SSD with carrier into the M9037A, perform the following steps:

- 1 Insert the SSD with carrier into the M9037A front panel so that it is completely seated into its connector.
- 2 The insertion resistance increases for the final connector mating.



If the SSD does not easily insert, do not force it. Check the alignment and try again. The SSD carrier should be flush with the M9037A front panel when properly installed.

3 Tighten the front panel two thumb screws to secure the SSD carrier to the M9037A. If the thumb screws do not thread properly, the SSD may not be fully inserted.

¹ These spare SSD drives will not work with the M9036A PXIe Embedded Controller.

Controller Maintenance Replacing the SSD

You can copy the operating system image from the Keysight provided SSD to your own SSD. Almost any 2.5 inch SATA III SSD will work. You must remove the original SSD from the carrier and add your new replacement SSD.

To swap out the SSD from the carrier, perform the following steps:




Figure 15 Remove the four SSD Mounting Screws

1 Remove the SSD from the carrier by removing the four mounting screws. See Figure 15.

- **2** To install an SSD, hold the removable SSD so that the top side is facing right as shown the figure above.
- **3** Install the SSD into the carrier. Use all four screws to secure the SSD to the bracket.

Memory Modules Controller Maintenance

Memory Modules

Keysight's M9037A has two memory connectors; one on top of the other. The module comes standard with one 4 GB memory module (installed in the bottom position). Optionally, 8 GB or 16 GB memory may be factory installed. Memory modules can be installed bringing the total memory to 16 GB. The controller uses DDR3 1600 SODIMM memory modules.

CAUTION

- Always observe ESD precautions. See "Electrostatic Discharge (ESD)" on page 62.

To remove memory modules from the controller:

- 1 Power off the PXIe chassis.
- **2** Remove the M9037A controller from the PXIe chassis. Observe all anti-static precautions.
- **3** Position the controller, top side up on the workbench as shown in Figure 14.




Figure 16 M9037A Memory Modules (both bottom and top modules shown)

- **4** Spread the two memory clamps for the module you want to replace.
- **5** The memory module should pop up. Carefully slide the memory module out of the edge connector.

To install memory modules, reverse the previous steps. Carefully place the memory module in the socket. Press the module into the clamps until they lock the module in place.

Replace the controller module in the PXIe chassis and power it up. The controller BIOS should automatically detect the new memory.

To verify the amount of memory installed in your controller: from the Windows **Start** menu, select **Computer**. Select **System Properties**. Under **System**, locate **Installed memory (RAM)**.

Memory Modules Controller Maintenance

NOTE

The M9037A was tested with the following RAM module configurations:

- one 4 GB RAM module
- one 8 GB RAM module
- two 8GB RAM modules (a total of 16 GB RAM)

Other configurations have not been tested.

NOTE

When replacing memory modules or installing additional memory modules, the two modules slots should have the same size and speed of modules. That is, both slots should have 4 GB modules or 8 GB modules, etc. Modules of different sizes in the slots are not supported.
